Reflections on Today's Readings
November 7 Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

1st Reading: 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14.

"It is my choice to die at the hands of men with the hope God gives of being raised up by him..." The martyrdom of the seven Jewish brothers and their mother takes place during the first century BC while the Seleucid Kings occupied Israel. The Seleucids were met with fierce opposition when they attempted to impose their Greek culture on the Israelites. In today's story, they try to force seven brothers and their mother to eat pork in violation of their dietary laws. They heroically choose death rather than comply. What is interesting to us, though, is the appearance here of a fervent belief in life after death not expressed heretofore in Jewish religious culture.

Psalm: 17:1, 5-6, 8, 15.

"Lord, when your glory appears, my joy will be full." The Psalmist pleads to the Lord for relief from unjust treatment, then affirms his faith in the confidence his plea will be answered.

2nd Reading: 2 Thessalonians 2:16 - 3:5.

"But the Lord is faithful; he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one." The Thessalonian community is upset by false teachers who tell them that the day of the Lord has already come and gone. Paul bolsters their faith, reminding them of the things that must happen before the Lord comes again and assuring them of the "constancy of Christ."

Gospel: Luke 20:27-38.

The Sadducees became the ruling priestly party during the Greek and Roman period of Israel's history. They were differed from the Pharisees, the other major religious party in their denial of the resurrection, the immortality of the soul and the existence of angels. They rejected likewise the oral traditions which the Pharisees maintained and emphasized as a Divinely ordained supplement to the written law. Here, they test Jesus with an outrageous hypothesis about a woman married seven times under the Law. Whose wife, they ask, will she be in the after life? Jesus responds that they cannot extrapolate earthly experience to what will happen when we are transformed in resurrection.

As we near the end of the current liturgical year, Luke's account of Jesus' ministry on Earth approaches its conclusions, and we read of "end of time" matters. Life after death, which appears as a concept only a century before the Christian era, reaches the fullness of its promise in Christ. He gave His life that we might have a more abundant life here on Earth and rise with Him through Baptism to eternal life. In Christ we will never die, but have a new life in and with Him for all eternity. God is a God of the living. Through His Son, He fulfills His promise that we are His people and that He will gather us into His house at the "end of time."

The Sadducees limited themselves to belief in the Pentateuch, the five Books of Moses. They left themselves no latitude to accept the oral tradition of the prophets, even of Moses himself, whom they revered. Moses acknowledged God as the God of Abraham, the God of Jacob and the God of Isaac. All three were long dead at the time God came to Moses in the burning bush, but Moses still recognized them as living in God. God, then, is the God of the living. The Resurrection is more than a hope, it is Christ's promise to us.


